Remembering Chadds Ford Blacksmith Willard Sharpless

We interpret the Sanderson Museum and property on many different levels, not just as the home of Chris Sanderson from 1937 – 1966.

A second interpretation recognizes blacksmith Willard Sharpless (1884 – 1959) who began renting

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the front portion of the house in the early 1900's from Horace Quinby and later from Lottie Brittingham Eachus, while the Sandersons lived in the back wing.

Sharpless ran his blacksmithing business from 2 buildings arranged in an L-shape along the stone wall in back of the house. In the below picture of Mrs. Sanderson weeding her garden, you can see the back part of the blacksmith shop. In the far background you can see the barn which used to be part of the Chadds Ford Barn Shops until it burned down in the mid 1980's.





These photographs at the side porch gardens are separated by over 80 years.

Sharpless's smithing was a major part of the Chadds Ford community. His ledgers of work orders (kept in the Pocopson Room) show names like L.H. Brittingham, Dr. Cleveland, Irénée DuPont, H.G. Haskell (Hill Girt Farm), Peter Hurd, William and Sellers Hoffman, as well as N.C. Wyeth.

In 1944 Sharpless had to have one of his legs amputated above the knee. It was Chris Sanderson who started a successful fund- raising drive to raise money for his prosthetic limb.

According to the Sanderson's first curator, the late Tommy Thompson (1918 – 2014), while both blacksmith structures have been torn down (the last after 1970) there are still remnants of these foundations visible in the back.

It has long been a dream of mine to create a planted area in the back corner of the property incorporating elements of the blacksmith shop foundations to honor Mr. Sharpless.

So, when we need to have any garden work done, our go-to person is museum volunteer Mary Ann Ulmann. Mary Ann has her degrees in elementary education as well as a two-year degree from the Temple University Ambler Campus in Horticulture and Landscape Design. Words like Clematis, Colchicum, Coleus and Liriope just fly off her lips. And watch out when she grabs at something and pronounces, "Invasive!"

In addition, Mary Ann and her work with the Delaware Valley Chapter of the North American Rock Society have won numerous ribbons at the Philadelphia Flower Show.

In the last few years, Mary Ann and her volunteers have cleared and started planting much of the area needed for the gardens. During the weeding and digging, more foundation rocks and a part of a water pump have been found.

There are now written plans for enlarging and adding to the garden this summer and fall. While it won't look like the OK Corral, there will be an item or two that might remind you of a blacksmith shop.

We also intend to have a rustic interpretive sign with a picture of Hannah Sanderson watching Mr. Sharpless shoe a beautiful gray draft horse in back of the side porch.

The work keeping the Sanderson gardens and flower boxes doesn't just happen by magic. Volunteers with garden gloves, loppers, rakes, watering cans, and hoses devote time and energy to their care. Thank you to volunteers Mary Ann Ulmann, Chuck Ulmann, Diane Camp, Gary and Mara Sharp, George Zahorcak, and Sally Hoey.

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
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VOLUNTEERS NEEDED
